### Future outlook

*Our goals, as outlined in our 2014 Annual Implementation Plan are as follows:*

- Implement evidence-based programs and teaching practices within every classroom - reading, phonics, spelling and maths problem solving.
- Develop Teaching of Reading, Spelling, Phonics and Maths Problem Solving - *Effective Teaching Practices*
- Implement and monitor *Gradual Release Model* ensuring the explicit teaching cycle is evident in each classroom.
- Continue to implement differentiation practices within each classroom.
- Use *Early Start* to profile literacy and numeracy standards of Prep students.
- Continue implementation of Australian Curriculum and C2C into each classroom - *Geography*.
- Ensure implementation of teaching and learning priorities are monitored through classroom observations, reflective practices and appropriate feedback to teachers.
- Continue to build leadership capability.
- Continue to provide a learning environment which is safe, where students are supported to learn and achieve and practices are inclusive of differences.

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### *How Information and Communication Technologies are used to assist learning*

Upon walking into each classroom you will notice a collection of well utilised computers. We also have a computer lab, located within our Resource Centre, which is used each day as tools to support student learning. Teachers and support staff use computers and I pads to supplement and broaden student learning.

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## Social climate

Lota State School is part of a small, yet highly supportive community. Our smaller school size allows us to know all students and for all students to know each staff member. These unique relationships are built on trust and mutual respect.

We have a comprehensive Responsible Behaviour Plan for Students which works around the concept of Active Citizenship. We strive to support the notion of students becoming active citizens within our school and broader community.

## Our school at a glance

Our motto is: *happy, safe, learning*. These three words are easily understood by all students. We have implemented a whole school program whereby students, who make appropriate behaviour choices, can be awarded a silver excellence pin at the conclusion of semester 1 and a gold excellence pin at the conclusion of semester 2.

Lota State School is part of the Chaplaincy Program. Our Chaplain Aaron visits our school two days each week and interacts with our students and their families. We operate the mentoring Chaplaincy Program.

## Reducing the school's environmental footprint

During 2013 Lota State School continued its Sustainable Environment Management Plan (SEMPan). We developed this document with the support of the Moreton Bay Environmental Education Centre (MBEEC). This plan sets out how we plan to reduce our ecological footprint. We achieved this by:

- Separation of waste and composting procedures.
- Ensuring power consumption savings across the school.

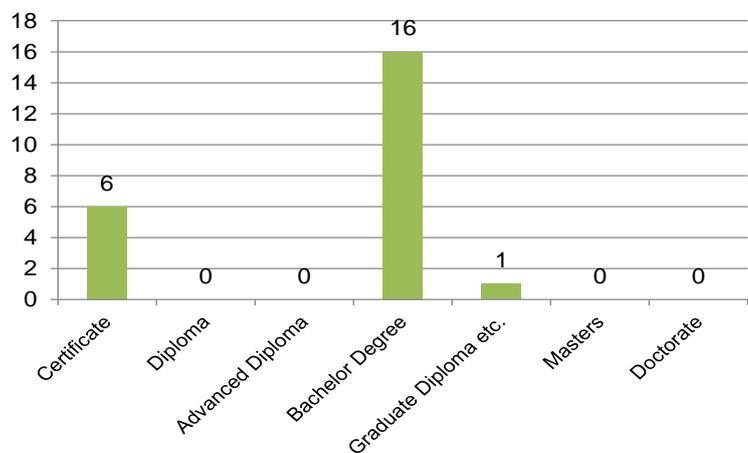

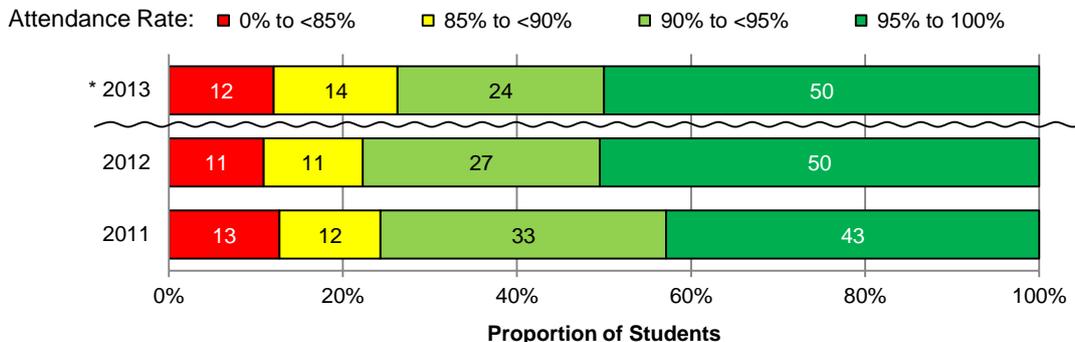

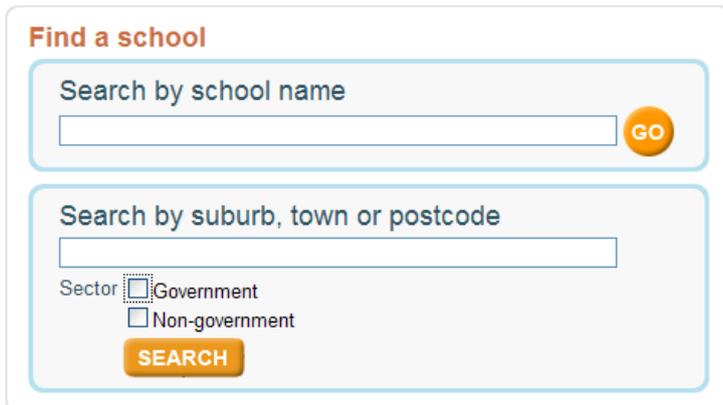
At Lota State School we require parents to inform us, before, on or immediately after, a child is absent from school. Should a pattern of absenteeism be noted by the classroom teacher they will immediately notify the Principal. The Principal will then contact the family concerned.
